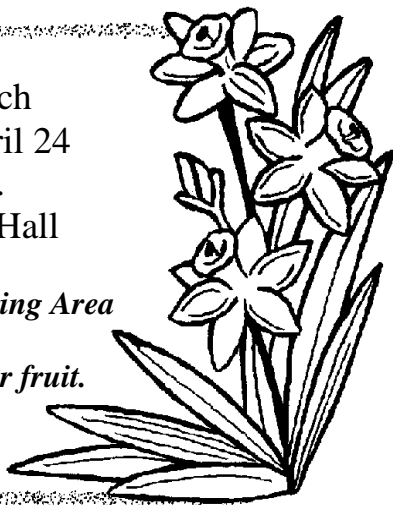

How is your reading going? It is not too late. Please join us in reading and writing in our daily prayer journal in "Unbinding Your Heart." This is a congregation-wide experience that will renew and transform our celebration of Easter. We want you to experience this amazing conversion along with the rest of us.

Whether you have yet to pick up "Unbinding Your Heart" or if you're current with the daily prayer journal and weekly small group gathering, I have a favor to ask of you.

Stop reading for a moment and enter into a special spiritual exercise. Ready? Ok. Relax. Now, imagine that you do not go to church on Sundays. Ever... Imagine that you do not know any hymns or Christian songs... Imagine that you do not know any Scripture... You don't know even the simplest Bible stories... Imagine that you are not sure if God hears you when you pray, or what words you should use to pray... Imagine that you don't know whom to call to pray for you... Imagine that you don't know how God feels towards you.... What if you didn't have a church family?.. Imagine...

Now let me ask you, *What does being a Christian mean to you? Make a list. What inspires your Christian journey? I have heard responses to this question such as: "I find comfort in my church." "I feel a purpose in my life." "I don't ever feel alone." "I have hope that everything will turn out alright one day." "I am a part of God's work in the world." All of these responses fill us up. Sometimes we are even motivated to share with others, because we know what a difference Jesus Christ makes in our own lives, right here and right now!*

Don't let Easter Sunday arrive, my friends, without telling someone what being a Christian means to you. Tell them how this church family helps you navigate all the bumps and bruises of life. Do it for yourself. Share your story as an expression of thanksgiving for all God has done for you. Remember, God's power can make genuine conversation into a life changing experience. It is my prayer that God's Spirit will inspire such conversation in all of us... before Easter.

Expressing our Faith ...

As I write this article in mid-March, we are newly setting out on our Lenten journey. The start of this journey happened on Ash Wednesday with a lovely service of music and the imposition of ashes. After the first Sunday of Lent, Victoria commented to me concerning the sheer amount of music in the services. Lent is a time where we typically look inward, evaluating our own faith journey. This process can be difficult but rewarding. But, we tend to add more music into the services during Lent. Music is one of the major ways that we express our faith. For example, during Lent, we add musical settings of Psalms related to our lectionary texts. During this season of Lent, we will sing congregational hymns, offer responsive readings, and participate in chanted Psalm tones to help draw us closer to God. We also add a musical setting of The Lord's Prayer that most of us know well and enjoy. This year, we are also adding in special instrumental selections during our communion distribution, hopefully allowing us to come to a deeper state of devotion as we prepare to take communion.



WORSHIP & MUSIC

Our 'Unbinding Your Heart' Lenten study first focused on the deconstruction of evangelism, asking us to consider a different way of thinking about what it means to be an evangelist. After our first 'Theology on Tap' discussion on this topic, we came to the conclusion that evangelism simply means that we should share and express our faith with comfort, joy, and love. That starts with expressing our faith in worship. Hopefully it will spill out into our daily lives, as we *be ourselves, see how God is working in our lives, and do that which God calls upon us. It is my hope (and the hope of all involved in our music ministry) that our musical offerings this Lent will aid your faith journey and help you to better express your faith.*

**Opportunity for PoP Youth Grades 1-12
To Earn a Religious Emblem Award**

The P.R.A.Y. program...

*Is a religious emblems program created by the national church bodies cooperating with P.R.A.Y. It is a CHURCH program, approved for use by the national youth agencies.



*It includes awards/emblems that are approved for wear on the official uniforms of the Boy Scouts of America, Girl Scouts of the U.S.A., Camp Fire USA, and American Heritage Girls.

*It is designed for boys and girls in grades one through twelve. All church youth (whether or not they belong to a scouting group) are eligible to participate.

*It consists of four different programs based on grade level. These grade levels roughly correspond to the different ranks in the scouting programs, but since the P.R.A.Y. program is a program of the church, it goes strictly by grade level (not by rank).

The four programs available are: God and Me (grades 1-3), God and Family (grades 4-5), God and Church (grades 6-8) and God and Life (grades 9-12). In this vivid memoir Yale professor Carlos Eire tells us stories of how he lived as a child of privilege as the son of an eminent judge in 1950's Havana. Everything changed when Castro came into power and even religion was outlawed. Eventually 14,000 children, including Carlos, were flown out of the country without their parents and deposited in Miami. Eire tells how he then became a "lost boy." He never saw his father again but he eventually found his way.

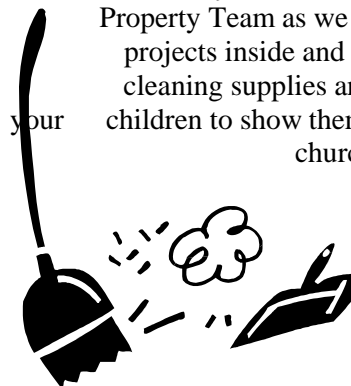

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A Word About ...

Why Do Lutherans Make the Sign of the Cross?

"In the name of the Father, and of the + Son, and of the Holy Spirit." These words begin the orders for Confession and Forgiveness in Evangelical Lutheran Worship. The rubric that accompanies these words says: "The minister leads the congregation in the invocation. The sign of the cross may be made by all in remembrance of their Baptism." As this invocation is made, an increasing number of Lutherans trace the sign of the cross over their bodies from forehead to breast, then from shoulder to shoulder; and others trace a small cross on their foreheads.

The sign of the cross, whether traced over the body or on the forehead, is a sign and remembrance of Baptism. The sign of the cross is ecumenical, in that it is used by the Orthodox, Roman Catholics, Lutherans and Episcopalians, and is slowly increasing in use among mainline Protestants. It is also a remembrance of the death and resurrection of our Lord: the center of our faith.

The sign of the cross is a treasured part of our liturgical heritage as Lutherans, because the practice was encouraged and used by Martin Luther himself. Luther made provisions for using the sign of the cross on at least four occasions. The text of Luther's 1526 Order of Baptism called for the sign of the cross to be made over the candidate as a part of Baptism. "Receive the sign of the holy cross on both your forehead and your breast" (Luther's Works 53:107). In his order for the Ordination of Ministers of the Word, Luther says of the benediction: "The ordinator blesses them with the sign of the cross" (Luther's Works, 53:126).

Luther instructed his followers to make the sign of the cross at both the beginning and the end of the day as a beginning to daily prayers. In the Small Catechism, in the section on morning and evening prayers Luther says: "When you get out of bed, bless yourself with the holy cross and say 'In the name of God, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. Amen.'" This same instruction is given for bedtime.

In current ecumenical usage, the sign of the cross is made or may be made at the following times or occasions: at Baptism; at the invocation in orders for confession and forgiveness; at reading of the Gospel, and at the benediction when a Trinitarian form of benediction (one that includes the words "Father, + Son, and Holy Spirit") is used, and during the final phrase of the Aaronic benediction.

Council Clippings

The March Council meeting was held on Tuesday March 12th. Highlights included:



- Eric Jorgensen presented the financial report. Giving is running on pace with the budget, while expenditures are slightly above budget. The increase in expenditures is due to the higher than normal snow removal costs that were incurred in January;
- Council voted to confirm Robert Long as Secretary of Council;
- Plans to enhance communication between Council and all of the PoP ministry teams were discussed;
- Council agreed that it would be beneficial to investigate the possibility of having a new photo directory made for PoP since the last one was done in 2007;
- Final plans for the Council Retreat on Saturday, March 19th were made. This year's retreat is taking place at the "renewable church" track at the Conference on Congregational Ministry. In addition to the planned discussions, there will be the opportunity to interact with hundreds of fellow Lutherans and experience the many stations describing the exciting work taking place in our Synod – including one by Lynn Lewis describing her future trip to Bosnia.

The next Council meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, April 12th at 7:30p.m. All PoP disciples are welcome to attend.

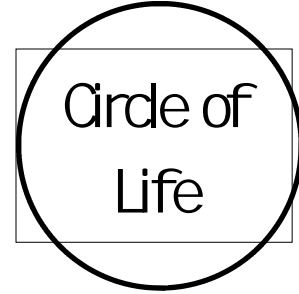
