Extraordinary Sunday Worship in May

May 1 – Second Sunday of Easter - Come hear about the 12th annual NJ Synod *Bosnia Servant Trip*. This summer the NJ Synod Travel

Team, including PoP's own Lynn Lewis, will host 14 Friendship Camps throughout Bosnia. These camps are for children ages 10-13, and are intended to help bring healing, hope and peace into their lives and their communities. Each camp has 60 to 350+ students, with 10-20 teachers present. May 8 – Third Sunday of Easter - Motherhood has long been seen as an experience in the sharing of the creative power of God; especially through the birthing, nurturing and sacrificing of maternal love. In these ways all who give motherly care reflect the nature, the actions and the being of our Mothering God. So come worship with us as we *welcome new disciples* in our midst through baptism and affirmation of baptism.

May 15 – Fourth Sunday of Easter - Our Easter celebration continues as we anticipate a new heaven and earth. The risen Lord is making all things new. In the mystery of holy baptism God has made us new people. On this Sunday the Lord Jesus invites us to see everyone in a new light - through the lens of love. Eight new disciples will join us around the table as they receive their *First Holy Communion*. Come worship with us, the God who hosts the Welcome Table!

May 23 – Fifth Sunday of Easter - The words of today's gospel are most often heard during a funeral service. Jesus says that he will prepare a place for each one of us. But as the text continues, we can see that our place is not an isolated room of our own in a giant heavenly mansion. Jesus' words are less about a place than a relationship: our relationship with Jesus and God the Father, and one another as God's baptized people. So come *take your place* and worship with us this Sunday!

May 29 – Sixth Sunday of Easter - Come experience a *youth-led worship!* Our sixth, seventh and eighth graders will remind us of Jesus' promises not to leave us orphaned. God is not some ruthless heavenly spectator judging us as on reality television, relishing our failures, wishing to exchange us for a better or more attractive child. Rather, God comes to love us in Jesus, singularly loving and accepting, seeking our trust, promising to be ever-present with us in the Holy Spirit.

Where do you see the Risen Lord? That is the question Easter pushes us to explore. Jesus wants his disciples (that's you and me!) to know that not only is he out of the tomb but he is to be seen where they are going. So, let me ask again. Where do you see Jesus?

Take a few moments now and ask yourself: *Where have I seen God's amazing grace and transformative power at work in my life? What stories can I tell of death and new life, of being lost and getting found, of deserving punishment and receiving forgiveness? When did I witness the mournful being comforted, the poor being satisfied, and the hungry fed? Where is the most surprising place I have seen God at work lately?*

And not only is God at work in the world bringing peace, reconciliation and hope, God calls and empowers us to participate in that mission. As St. Paul wrote in his second letter to the Christians in Corinth, God promises us: "There is all-surpassing power at work within you. I put it there so that you can participate in what I am up to in the world. Do not be afraid. Use that power to do good and share the good news."

Sometimes fear does take hold of us, preventing us from doing what we ought to be doing for God and the world. And when it does, Easter helps us consider, and consider again, how life is different when we see Jesus at home, in our neighbor, the workplace, and our community. The world looks different when we see with the eyes of faith and are able to glimpse what God is already doing.

Please join me this Easter season in asking God to keep our eyes open in our everyday life to see what God is doing. Let me know what you see; send me an email, give me a call. Write about it on our website (www.popnj.org). I know seeing God more often in and through the people we live, work, play and serve with will have an amazing impact on how the world looks.

New CD Features PoP Musicians

On Easter Sunday, the music ministry unveiled a new CD recording. The recording is called *Gifted By Grace*. The project contains 21 different tracks containing a wide variety of our favorite songs, anthems, and hymns. I'm very proud of all of our musicians, as they've put their heart and soul into this recording. It is our hope that this recording will be a blessing to all of you for many years to come.

Thanks to current technology, our recording was made possible with very few funds invested. We are making CD copies as needed right at the church, resulting in no waste or overruns. Copies of the CD are available with a suggested donation of \$10, with proceeds going to offset our production costs as well as going to a newly-established Music Fund that will be used to facilitate future special projects. The music tracks from the CD are also available for direct MP3 download from our church website. (There is no suggested donation for tracks downloaded from the website.)

The music on the CD is designed to roughly take the listener through the entire church year. We start and end with settings of Luther's Morning and Evening Prayers. We have selections from the season of Advent, Christmas, Epiphany, Lent, Easter and Pentecost. The new liturgy that was written for PoP and used last fall is also included throughout the CD.

Finally, there are some of our favorite praise and worship songs. College Aid Now Available through Wurffel Memorial Fund

While the amount of funds available is limited, Lutheran students are encouraged to apply. Terms for the loans will be very beneficial to recipients.

Eligibility is described as: "Any member of a New Jersey Synod, ELCA congregation planning to attend or enrolled in a matriculated program of study in an accredited four-year or two-year college or university may apply. Loans are for undergraduate study only.

Priority of consideration is given on the basis of activity in the life of the church as described by the recommendation letter of the applicant's pastor and on the basis of need.

Priority is given first to students attending any ELCA Lutheran College or University, then to any accredited two or four-year college or university.

When I was a young man, my favorite great aunt Violet told me that she wanted me to know that when I was prepared to get married, she wanted me to have her diamond ring to give to my fiancée.

I was overwhelmed. I couldn't believe that she was willing to give away something so precious to her. She and my uncle Frank were a wonderful couple, loving in every sense of the word. His death was a great tragedy for us all.

When I was prepared to become engaged to Alice, I went to Aunt Violet and asked if she did, indeed, want me to have that ring. When she gave it to me she cried ... not because she was losing something, but because she loved me so much that she knew that something that signaled her love for her husband would live on in the love I have for Alice.

She understood the theology of abundance, in which there is no ultimate quantity of love to be shared among a select few. Those who believe in a more limited quantity follow a theology of scarcity, in which we must be careful not to distribute our goods too widely; for fear that there won't be enough.

My Aunt Violet understood that by giving Alice and me a piece of her love, it didn't diminish her supply of love. There was plenty to go around.

This story of two children growing up in Germany during WWII has an unusual narrator - Death. Death tells the tale of Liesel Meminger and her best friend, Rudy. Liesel, a 9-year-old orphan, lives with a foster family in Rudy's small German town. She arrives having just stolen her first book, and her kindly foster father uses it, *The Gravediggers Handbook*, to lull her to sleep when she suffers nightmares regarding her younger brother's death. Once Liesel learns to read she goes on to steal more books and becomes the "book thief." This makes her life bearable but does not shield her and Rudy from the horrors of war-torn Germany.

To get the process started, four or five interested individuals are necessary to hear about the LifeTouch program, consider the various responsibilities, and decide on the dates.

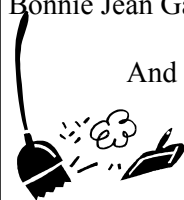

Christian Symbols **Valleys**

NJ Synod 2011 Bosnia International Servant Trip

A Ministry of Healing, Hope, and Peace

Bosnian War

Bosnia declared its independence from Yugoslavia in early 1992, following years of ethnic tensions, intense fear and hatred spread by (primarily) Serb Nationalists and, to a lesser extent, Croat Nationalists. This sparked a civil war, one that was brutally targeted against the civilian population. The war officially ended in December 1995 with the signing of the Dayton Peace Accords. The fighting ended in early 1996.

NJ Synod Bosnia IST History

The NJ Synod held its first International Servant Trip (IST) to Croatia and Bosnia in 2000. Since then, they have held 128 Friendship Camps in 24 schools, three orphanages and with two organizations for children with special needs. About 18,500 children and teachers have participated. They've taken 143 Travel Team members, 59 of whom have gone at least two times.

Bosnia IST Goals

Our ministry goals continue to be very direct: **HEALING, HOPE, PEACE.**

Our ministry builds peace: Jason Reed (St. Paul, Hainesport) was in the Serb village of Sipovo waiting in a bank, when a Chetnik (a radical, nationalist Serb) called out to him in Serbian, "Why do Americans hate Serbs?" - but he asked it in a very personal way - "Why do you hate me?" Jason responded that he didn't hate him and that all Americans didn't hate Serbs. "But you bomb our towns and kill our people," was the Chetnik's response. They talked for five minutes. As Jason left, Vesna, his interpreter (a Baptist Serb from Croatia) turned to him and said, "Do you know what they are talking about back there [in the bank]? They are questioning everything they thought they knew about Americans; everything they have been told about Americans." The next year when they returned to this town, Jason was interviewed on their radio station, and had the opportunity to share why we came back to Sipovo.

The Need

While in some places things are improving, there is still much hatred and separation: "Never forgive! Never forget!" There is also a real fear that this war could start up again in the next 10-20 years, as so many of the wounds have never been treated. For many, there has been no justice, often with little attempt at true reconciliation. The young people continue to suffer from the current difficulties, as well as the effects from the most recent wars. We continue to be asked back by leaders who tell us we are about important work and that we are engaged in critically need efforts.

Congregational Involvement

Each year members of our congregations spend thousands of hours serving the children of Bosnia through the Home Team projects. They have made thousands of teddy bears, lions, hug pillows and more. Their involvement can deepen their understanding of Christian servanthood in the world and increase their awareness of the need for peace and prayer. It can also serve as a springboard for new ministry endeavors.

Ways Prince of Peace can help:

- Friendship Camp Sponsorships – The church or an individual can sponsor a full camp or a portion of a camp. The full cost is \$2,400. However, you can sponsor a portion of a camp – one half, one quarter - as well.
- Decorate Tote Bags - PoP disciples Nancy Reyes and Gail Campbell have donated their free time decorating
- canvas tote bags. The full Home Team has a targeted goal of 2,400 canvas bags – one for each child who will attend one of the Friendship camps this summer.
- Sew small "Peace Pillows" - instructions and pattern available on the Home Team page of the website listed below.
- Donating Sports Equipment – each camp is given approximately \$125 - \$150 of sports equipment for the schools to use in the next school year. Information is also available on the Home Team page.
- Donating 2,400 boxes of crayons and/or donating Bandanas
- Offer Prayer Support – The Travel Team will travel to Bosnia on June 22 - July 3.

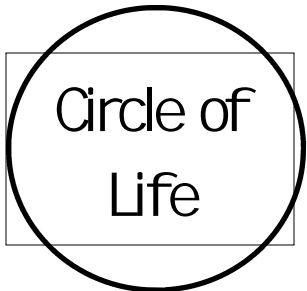
